The Spirit of Alaska People Helping People

Helping our neighbors through hard times is a time-honored Alaskan practice. The Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) provides an easy, convenient way to share in that tradition. This year's FAA campaign in Southcentral Alaska will begin on September 21, 1992, and will end on October 9, 1992.

Since CFC is community oriented, the Fairbanks area (Northern Alaska) and Juneau area (Southeast Alaska) will have separate campaigns.

"Federal workers are used to serving people," says **Bob Stinson**, campaign chair for the FAA Combined Federal Campaign in Southcentral Alaska. "CFC is not a management program. It is based on people helping people — each of us to care for the other."

Many of us and our families have benefitted from CFC organizations: youth groups, day care, community action groups, medical research, etc.

The United Way office in Anchorage is an independent office, and 99 percent of the money donated through the CFC stays in Alaska to support organizations such as the Tundra Tykes Day Care Center and over 40 other local voluntary agencies.

Last year, 92 cents of every dollar you gave went directly to the charities, and payroll deduction makes it easy and convenient to give.

The Spirit of Alaska **CFC: The Iditarod Legacy** ***People Helping People***

Established at the turn of the century, the Iditarod Trail was a mail and supply route that stretched from Seward to the gold town of Iditarod. When word reached Nome that gold had been discovered in the Interior, the rest of the trail was born. Nome needed that trail, for in 1925, as diphtheria loomed over that Bering Sea village, 300,000 units of serum to suppress the epidemic were sent by train to Nenana. Then 20 Alaskan men and their tenacious dogs carried the serum by relay 684 frozen miles from Nenana to Nome in just 127.5 hours.


The spirit of the original Iditarod was people helping people. The Iditarod legacy is people helping people through the Combined Federal Campaign.

Combined Federal Campaign Southcentral Alaska 1991-1992 Results

The dedicated efforts of last year's Combined Federal Campaign volunteers in our area provided enough funds to do all of these:

- ✈ Provide 176 days of protective child care to children in danger of abuse and neglect;
- ✈ Train 423 tutors to teach illiterate persons to read and write;
- ✈ Support 846 young people in delinquency-prevention programs for 1 year;
- ✈ Shelter 20 homeless people a night each day of the year;
- ✈ Feed 10,988 meals to homeless people;
- ✈ Feed 775 starving refugee children in the Sudan for a year;
- ✈ Assist 423 terminally ill persons and their families through the final months of life;
- ✈ Give time-out to parents of developmentally disabled children by providing 211 days of respite care;
- ✈ Distribute 233,919 pounds of surplus food to organizations serving people in need; and
- ✈ Guide 423 sexual assault victims through recovery.


