Bethel made the international news last month when an AN-12 Russian cargo plane arrived from Cape Schmidta, Siberia. After a two-day stay, 40 young muskox in crates were loaded onto the aircraft for transplant in Siberia. The Russian crew members were very congenial and pictures and cigarettes were exchanged. Three USAF personnel, one of which was an interpreter, accompanied the Russians during the entire trip. Two Russian scientists, who had been here for several weeks overseeing the muskox movement from Nunivak Island to Bethel, departed on the AN-12. It was quite exciting to be an eye witness to this cultural exchange between two great nations.

Since Bethel is the distribution center of the Yukon-Kuskokwim area for nearly all surface/air freight, sizeable amounts of Federal and State funds are allocated here. The State Division of Aviation will spend over two million dollars improving our airport this summer; paving the new taxiway and parking ramps. Wien Air Alaska plans to complete by next fall a 200' x 60' two-story terminal. The Corps of Engineers will supervise a several million dollar contract for construction of new docking facilities a short distance downriver from the Bethel townsite. Other projects slated for our summer construction boom include a second Kuskokwim Community College building, another 33-unit apartment house to be built by the Bethel Native Corporation, and a forty-room addition to the Kuskokwim Inn, plus a larger, entirely new restaurant. New FAA NAVAIDS will be installed at Aniak and St. Marys. Bethel has got to be the fastest growing bush village in the state.

Our social events are beginning to pickup after the winter doldrums. The Literary Society (poker club) continues to meet once a week. The Bairds held a birthday dance at the Bethair Clubhouse for daughter Bobette, who is now a teen-ager. Perhaps some of you remember Joe Paquette. Have seen Joe around town often and he seems to be doing well.


HOMER (CONT'D)
